More Nostalgia

Steve Tolen came downstairs a little while before the services ended on Yom Kipper and met Joseph Stulberg in the lobby. He told Steve that he thought his grandfather may have built the ark in the sanctuary. With a little research on our part, including his sister Mira, it was confirmed that Harry Leiberman of Bangor, MI, was his grandfather and , in fact, he did build the ark.

Mr. Leiberman was a very interesting, creative man. Emigrating from Russia after escaping the Russian army, he came to Chicago and bought a small lumber yard. Unfortunately, he lost that lumber yard during the depression. As a trade with the bank, he acquired land in Bangor and, along with his wife and two daughters, moved to this area. He farmed, ran a resort and worked as a woodworker. He helped rebuild a structure at Fidelman's resort in the 50's after a fire. Barry does remember a fire in the "White House" and remembers that it was rebuilt.

He was a master craftsman as one can see by looking at the ark. He not only designed and built the structure, but also carved all the lettering and probably carved the lions that are at the top of the ark. He also built the ark in Kalamazoo's Congregation of Moses. We are so lucky to have had such a wonderful craftsman to have built our ark. Everyone who sees it for the first time is so impressed that a little synagogue in such a small town has such an impressive sanctuary.
