## Vorts - Rabbi Alan Cohen

Understanding prayer is the first step to an enhanced and meaningful experience at services. In the next newsletters, I will be explaining some of the prayers we recite. The two central prayers for us are the Shema and the Amidah. I continue with the Shema:

6. "Philosophers asked the Jewish elders in Rome, 'If your God does not want idolatry to exist, why does He not eradicate it?' They replied, 'He would if people worshipped things that were of no importance, but they worship the sun, moon, stars, and planets. Should He destroy the universe because of fools? The world pursues it natural course, and those who act wrongly will have to account for their actions. Similarly, if a man stole a measure of wheat and then sowed it in the ground, it is only right that it should not grow, but the world pursues its natural course, and those who act wrongly will have to account for their actions." (Talmud Avodah Zarah 54b)
