Dr. Linda J. Borish, Associate Professor, Western Michigan University History and Gender/ Women's Studies Departments, researches sport history, women's and gender history and American Jewish history, and is the author of numerous articles. She co-authored Sports in American History: From Colonization to Globalization (2008) and is executive producer/historian on the documentary, Jewish Women in American Sport: Settlement Houses to the Olympics (2007).

Aimee Ergas, JHSM's Research Director and Collections Archivist for Jewish Detroit, Walter P. Reuther Library, Archives of Labor and Urban Affairs at Wayne State University, is the lead researcher and author of Michigan Women Who Made a Difference: Builders of the Detroit Jewish Community (2015).

Dr. Kirsten Fermaglich, Associate Professor of History and Jewish Studies at Michigan State University, has published several papers on Holocaust studies and early feminism, and served as co-curator of "Uneasy Years: Michigan Jewry During Depression and War." Dr. Fermaglich is currently working on her second book, A Rosenberg by Any Other Name, which explores the history of name changing in New York City.

Dr. Karla Goldman, the Sol Drachler Professor of Social Work at the University of Michigan, directs the Jewish Communal Leadership Program and teaches American Jewish history. She has served as Historian in Residence at the Jewish Women's Archive (2000-2008). She is the author of Beyond the Synagogue Gallery: Finding a Place for Women in American Judaism and is currently writing a book on Cincinnati's Jewish history.

Lori Jacobs' first album, *Free*, released in 1972, launched a nationwide vocal tour. Upon her return she became involved in community theater, including the Jewish Theatre Grand Rapids (The Last Night of Ballyhoo, The Cemetery Club, Chaim's Lovesong, and Golda's Balcony). In 2015, she played the role of Dr. Ruth Westheimer in Mark St. Germain's production of Becoming Dr. Ruth in Grand Rapids.

Temple Emanuel

Our conference site, Temple Emanuel, is the fifth oldest Reform congregation in the United States. Founded in 1857, the congregation built its first home in 1881 in downtown Grand Rapids. In 1952, Temple Emanuel relocated to its current building, designed by worldrenowned architect Eric Mendelsohn. Mendelsohn incorporated tall clerestory windows high in the sanctuary to allow in natural light and moveable walls to permit the congregation to divide space as needed. The building also features a 1,000 square foot mural painted by Lucienne Bloch Dimitroff, a

protégée of Diego Rivera and the daughter of the American composer Ernest Bloch.

> *Gustav G.A. Wolf, who* served as president of Temple Emanuel from 1909-1914, and his two brothers gave a beautiful signed Louis Comfort Tiffany stained glass window to the congregation. The Tiffany is now on permanent display at the synagogue.

A coach bus will depart from the JCC - West Bloomfield at 7:00 a.m. and return by 8:00 p.m. The bus fee includes bus transportation, driver tip, and Meijer Gardens. The bus will make a pre-arranged dinner stop on the return trip. Cost for dinner is not included.

Travel Stipend

The Michigan Humanities Council provides a travel stipend to those living more than 50 miles away. Stipend forms will be available at the conference. In addition, those coming to the conference from the U.P. will be entitled to hotel room reimbursement.

How to submit a biography to our collection

Help us record "herstory."

Biographies – long or short - of the Michigan women in your life "who made a difference" will help us create a permanent record. A downloadable biography form is available on our website, www.michjewishhistory.org/mwwmd. A form can also be mailed. Submitting a biography is simple:

- 1. Go to: www.michjewishhistory.org and click on Michigan Women Who Made a Difference.
- 2. Scroll to, "How to Identify a Michigan Jewish Woman Who Made a Difference." Download the fillable PDF biography form.
- 3. At this point, **PLEASE SAVE THE FORM** to your computer. Close the website, and reopen your form.
- 4. Complete as much of the information as you can for pages 1 and 2.
- 5. The rest of the form is narrative and is where you can **share a story**, or relate what you know of her accomplishments. Every biography, short or long, is important.
- 6. Be sure to consider if you have any **photos or original documents** that you can add to the biography. These can be scanned and attached to the email, or copied and mailed to our office.
