Vorts - Rabbi Alan Cohen

Understanding prayer is the first step to an enhanced and meaningful experience at services. In the next newsletters, I will be explaining some of the prayers we recite. The two central prayers for us are the Shema and the Amidah.

The middle blessings of the weekday Amidah (numbers 4-17) are considered petitionary. They "constitute a prayer for the redemption of Israel from exile and for the restoration of the institutions of independence. This prayer was formulated and instituted by Rabban Gamliel around 100 C.E. in Yavneh" according to the Talmud (Megillah 17b). The sages had established an academy of learning there after the Romans destroyed the Second Temple in 70 C.E. Thus, learning and living would continue even after the Temple was no more. Deeds of loving kindness were to be prioritized.
